The four steps to selecting a high school

Overview

Selecting a high school is an important decision that has big implications for a student's college and career readiness. Our High School Success Program exists to (1) provide scholars and families with information about all of the high school options available to them so they can make informed, careful decisions and (2) support scholars and families in applying for and enrolling in high schools that will meet their needs well. How does high school enrollment work in Springfield?

The SPS balloting process is similar to a charter school lottery with a few key differences.

The primary one being that there is some choice and some chance built into the system. Families are asked to rank order their school choices and then a lottery is employed for school assignments. Home address/boundaries as they exist for SPS elementary school assignments do not play a

role. Previous school performance or qualifications do not play a role with the exception of **Putnam and Springfield Honors Academy** which have additional admission requirements. In order to attend either of those schools, there are criteria that students

What key dates should I know about?

Key deadlines, as well as an overview of important timelines for high school enrollment, are below:

- November-January: Applicants for some application schools open (Springfield Honors Academy, Pope Francis, etc.)
 - November 30 Early decision deadline for Springfield Honors Academy

To consider: You can apply for a charter school AND submit a SPS ballot to give your child more options. You will learn about charter school admission in March and learn about the results of the SPS balloting process in April.

• January:

- <u>Early January</u> Springfield Prep families will need to <u>register online</u> so their child can participate in the high school balloting process.
- Mid January Balloting Window Opens. This window is open for 4 weeks and there is no preference given for those who complete their ballot early.

• February:

- Mid February SPS Balloting window closes
- Mid February (or early March) Charter school application deadlines

• March:

March 15 — All charter schools must conclude their principal enrollment process by this date (i.e., if you applied to a charter school, you will know whether your child got a seat by this date. Note that there is a chance they could be admitted in future lotteries).

April:

Mid April — SPS High School assignments are posted

Metco

The Metropolitan Council for Educational Opportunity (METCO) program is a program designed to "expand educational opportunities, increase diversity, and reduce racial isolation by permitting students in Springfield to attend public schools in other communities that have agreed to participate". Students from Springfield may attend schools in East Longmeadow, Hampden/Wilbraham, Longmeadow and Southwick-Tolland, through this program, and transportation is provided. The application to apply for METCO is here and is typically open between February and April for the following school year. METCO at a glance.

School Choice & Schools in Surrounding Communities






How can I learn more about each school?
